Emergency Response and Disaster Preparedness Glossary

Emergency Response: The immediate actions taken by individuals, organizations, or authorities to address and mitigate the impacts of an emergency or disaster.

Disaster Preparedness: The process of planning, organizing, and training to effectively respond to and recover from a disaster, ensuring the safety and well-being of individuals and property.

Emergency Management: The comprehensive approach to preparing for, responding to, recovering from, and mitigating the impacts of emergencies and disasters.

Incident Command System (ICS): A standardized management system used by emergency response agencies to coordinate and manage on-scene operations during emergencies.

Hazard: A source of potential harm or danger that may cause harm to individuals, property, or the environment.

Risk Assessment: The process of evaluating potential risks and determining the likelihood and impact of specific hazards on a given area or population.

Evacuation: The process of moving individuals from a dangerous area to a safe location in response to an emergency or disaster.

Shelter-in-Place: The strategy of remaining indoors and taking cover to protect oneself from hazards such as severe weather, chemical spills, or acts of violence.

Emergency Kit: A collection of essential items and supplies that individuals should have on hand to sustain themselves during emergencies or disasters.

First Aid: The immediate care given to an injured or ill person before professional medical help arrives, aiming to stabilize the individual's condition and prevent further harm.

Search and Rescue: The coordinated efforts to locate, extract, and provide aid to individuals who are trapped, injured, or missing during emergencies or disasters.

Mass Casualty Incident (MCI): An event in which the number of casualties exceeds the resources available to respond effectively, requiring a coordinated multi-agency response.

Damage Assessment: The process of evaluating the extent of damage caused by an emergency or disaster to determine the resources needed for response and recovery efforts.

Recovery: The phase following an emergency or disaster in which affected communities rebuild, repair, and restore their physical, social, and economic infrastructure.

Business Continuity Planning (BCP): The process of developing strategies and procedures to ensure that essential functions of a business can continue during and after an emergency or disaster.

Critical Infrastructure: The physical and cyber systems that are essential for the functioning of a society, including transportation, energy, water, and communication systems.

Community Resilience: The ability of a community to prepare for, respond to, and recover from emergencies and disasters while maintaining social cohesion and economic stability.

Public-Private Partnership: Collaboration between government entities and private sector organizations to enhance emergency preparedness, response, and recovery efforts.

Emergency Operations Center (EOC): A centralized facility where emergency response and coordination activities are managed during large-scale emergencies or disasters.

Warning System: The network of technologies and procedures used to alert individuals and communities of impending hazards and emergencies.

Personal Protective Equipment (PPE): Gear and clothing worn to protect individuals from hazards and contaminants during emergency response and recovery operations.

Training and Exercises: Activities designed to enhance the knowledge, skills, and readiness of individuals and organizations to respond effectively to emergencies and disasters.

Resource Management: The process of efficiently allocating and coordinating personnel, equipment, and supplies during emergency response and recovery operations.

Incident Action Plan (IAP): A written document that outlines the objectives, strategies, and tactics for managing and resolving an emergency or disaster incident.

Chain of Command: The hierarchical structure of authority within an organization or emergency response team, defining roles and responsibilities during operations.

Communication Plan: A strategy for disseminating information and coordinating communication among stakeholders during emergencies and disasters.

Interoperability: The ability of different agencies, organizations, and systems to work together effectively and share information during emergency response and recovery efforts.

National Incident Management System (NIMS): A framework established by the U.S. government to standardize emergency management practices and promote interoperability among response agencies.

Incident Response Team (IRT): A group of trained individuals responsible for responding to and managing emergencies within an organization or community.

Continuity of Operations (COOP): The process of ensuring that essential functions and services of an organization can continue during and after a disaster or emergency.

Emergency Broadcast System (EBS): A system used to quickly disseminate critical information and alerts to the public through various media channels during emergencies.

Emergency Medical Services (EMS): The system of pre-hospital care and transportation provided to individuals in need of urgent medical attention during emergencies and disasters.

Emergency Response Team (ERT): A group of trained individuals within an organization responsible for responding to and managing emergencies in the workplace.

Incident Report: A detailed account of an emergency or disaster incident, documenting the timeline, actions taken, and outcomes for review and analysis.

Debriefing: A structured discussion or meeting held after an emergency response operation to review performance, identify lessons learned, and improve future response efforts.

Tabletop Exercise: A simulation of an emergency scenario conducted in a group setting to test response plans, communication protocols, and decision-making processes.

After-Action Report: A formal document that evaluates the effectiveness of an emergency response operation, identifies strengths and areas for improvement, and makes recommendations for future actions.

Public Information Officer (PIO): A designated individual responsible for managing external communications and media relations during emergencies and disasters.

Emergency Response Plan (ERP): A comprehensive document that outlines the procedures, roles, and responsibilities for responding to various types of emergencies within an organization.

Emergency Management Agency (EMA): A government agency at the local, state, or federal level responsible for coordinating emergency response and preparedness efforts.

Emergency Operations Plan (EOP): A detailed blueprint that outlines how an organization will respond to emergencies and disasters, including roles, procedures, and resource allocations.

Incident Commander: The individual responsible for overall management and coordination of an emergency response operation, making critical decisions and ensuring effective communication.
